2011 was another year of significant progress in the District in all of our service areas. Our seven year journey of District revitalization was most evident when we were notified that the Houston Association of Realtors (HAR) had agreed to our request to use our District boundaries as a distinct geographic area. Why is this important one might ask? For that, a bit of background is needed. When talk of a District first came about seven years ago, the area we now know as the Brays Oaks District was commonly referred to as Fondren Southwest. Early this year we met with the HAR mapping team and presented our case that our community should be recognized as Brays Oaks and not included in the designation of Zone 20, Bellaire South. To our

delight we were contacted by HAR in October and notified that our recommendations had been accepted as reflected on the map in the business section of this newsletter.

During the year we reported on the District expansion to include the remainder of the Braeburn Super Neighborhood and the entirety of the Westbury Subdivision. This change added a new board member, Ms. Cindy Chapman, who you will learn more about in this edition. The expansion will also require updates to our Service and Assessment Plan which was up for renewal in 2012. Through this expansion, new services and plans will grow over time and we invite all of our new community partners in Braeburn and Westbury to attend upcoming board and/or committee meetings and get involved in the District.

If I had to choose one word to express 2011's advances in Public Safety it would be "Watershed". Watershed in that it marked a clear division between the days and perception of Fondren SW and the rebirth and realization of the phoenix now established as Brays Oaks. In October we celebrated the grand opening of the South Gessner Patrol Station. We continue to expand our public safety program through creative collaboration and we have partnered with the County Attorney to create a unique partnership that assists us in prosecuting undesirable nuisance businesses who try and operate in the District. We also expanded our after school bus program to include Westbury Christian and the India House. The good news which began in July of 2010 when the Heart of our District - 77071 was named one of the "Top 10 Safest Zip Codes" in Houston continued through 2011 with crime at a six year low.


In environmental and urban design we created a new litter abatement program. In keeping with our promise to make this the best District in Houston, we recognized that additional services were required in terms of litter abatement and general cleaning of the public rights-of-way. In business development we have created the Relocation Houston Program which is an initiative to showcase the District and Houston as an ideal place to work and live. We have hired a professional consultant, Davis Consulting, to assist with this outreach program. As we move forward into 2012 our comprehensive strategy will be tracked to gauge successes of the programs developed.

We hope that you will enjoy reading of all of our successes in this 2011 year in review and look forward to sharing even more good news in the coming year. Our best wishes for a safe and wonderful holiday season and a blessed New Year.
















Early in 2011 the District team began working with the Houston Association of Realtors (HAR) on their new mapping system that was under development. HAR had as their chief goal to recognize areas in the region that had changed over time. With the rapid growth over the past ten years, there were so many new and revitalized areas that they felt clarification was needed. To that end the District hosted meetings of real estate professionals to work with HAR to assist with the reclassification. The District had long maintained that Brays Oaks should be its own designated area in the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) and not a part of Zone 20, Bellaire South. In October we were notified that HAR had accepted our recommendations and Brays Oaks will appear as its own designation in the near future and no longer be known commonly as Fondren Southwest. As a part of our rebranding efforts this is another significant step in the right direction or as our Chairman, Etan Mirwis said, "absolutely awesome".

2011 Real Estate Forum

On October 4th the District hosted a joint real estate forum along with the Greater Sharpstown and International Management Districts. The key note was Jesse Thompson of the Federal Reserve and a panel discussion of real estate professionals was also assembled from the Districts and Margie Dorrance of HAR. The program highlighted the strengths of each District and the on-going revitalizations underway. The event was held at the Junior League and is intended to be an annual event. 

Keeping the Bistrict Clean & Green From VISION to REALITY

The District is very active in removing the visual blight caused by graffiti. Graffiti abated by the District is color matched and chronicled for HPD investigations. To date the District has abated over 1,300 individual incidents of graffiti. We are grateful to our community partners and residents who actively assist us in reporting incidents. We are also working closely with our graffiti abatement contractor and HPD to identify and prosecute the individuals responsible for graffiti in our District.

We encourage all residents and businesses to join the in the effort to help us eradicate graffiti from the District by reporting to 3-1-1 or by going on-line to www.BraysOaksMD.org and reporting incidences via the "Report a Problem" button on the home page.

The District also provides funding for street light surveys which are performed bi-monthly with outages reported to CenterPoint Energy for repair. This year the District reported over 900 lights to CenterPoint for repair.

iliter Abatement

Recognition that the area needs to look the way it feels prompted Elaine Gaskamp, the District's Chair of the Environmental and Urban Design Committee, to request a new approach in the way the District handles its litter abatement. Acting on recommendation from the committee, the Board agreed to hire a contractor who would be solely dedicated to the District to handle: litter abatement, bandit sign removal, return of shopping carts to stores, and mowing of the under maintained public rights-of-way.

In just three months since their implementation the team has collected over 10,000 lbs of trash, mowed 400 rights-of-way, collected over 500 bandit signs and returned 48 shopping carts to their store of origin. The litter crew can be easily identified by the signature white service truck with the District logo on the driver and passenger doors.

Initiatives

"The District really has a lot to be proud of - old alliances and new partnerships have really made all the difference" says David Hawes, Executive Director of the Brays Oaks District. This year the District solidified its commitment to public safety by partnering with HPD by funding of mobile camera emplacements, running statistical analysis and identifying crime hot spots for targeted enforcement. We also committed resources to go after nuisance properties, keep at risk teenagers off the streets with our after school bus program and partnered with one of the longest running apartment safety coalitions in the City. These efforts in part contributed to the District receiving recognition for "Excellence in Public Safety" by Houston City Council's Public Safety Committee for 2011.

Mobile Surveillance Cameras

The District began the use of mobile cameras in January of 2010. Since that time, the District has been able to track major reductions in crime in and around the areas where they have been deployed. Mobile surveillance cameras have proven to be an excellent deterrent and investigative tool for our local law enforcement officers. The units have a self-contained digital video recorder (DVR) which local law enforcement can access and retrieve data to aid in their investigations. The District has plans to expand this program next year and will deploy extra cameras this year near

Early on the District understood the need to partner with the Houston Police Department by aiding in the dissemination of notifications of community related events. The District assists HPD by notifying the community of Police Interaction Program (P.I.P) events and promotion of HPD's Blue Star Program. In 2011, a joint venture between the District and HPD's Hot Spot team resulted in the capture and prosecution of a prolific graffiti tagger whose defacements had cost the city and neighboring districts over \$30,000 in abatement expenditures. With the addition of an Assistant County Attorney contracted to the District the management district is building a coalition of State, County, and City law enforcement agencies working in tandem with one another to address nuisance properties in the community. With this coalition at work, 2012 looks to be a year that will set its own benchmarks.

Crime Mapping /Analytics

The District receives a monthly report of all crimes committed in the community each month. This data is filtered via a Geographical Information System (G.I.S.) and used to identify high crime properties and crime trends. This data is extremely useful and helps aid in the allocation of resources and tracking the impact of proactive crime prevention measures.

Apartment Cluster Committee Meetings

The District's Multi-Family Initiatives are a holistic approach to improving our apartment communities featuring components to exchange tenant information, pro-active crime prevention and featured guest speakers who address the concerns of our multi-family communities. This year the District partnered with local public safety icons, Perry Radoff and Ruth Hurst, to address crime in the District's multi-family communities. Ruth Hurst has been chairing the apartment cluster meetings for 17 years and has welcomed the participation of the District in her efforts. These apartment cluster meetings are open for membership to all multi-family property owners and managers in the community. After School Bus Program

Since 2009, the District has provided after-school bus service for the two middle schools in the District (Fondren and Welch). Services to Westbury Christian were added this year. The District funds after school bus services for children who would like to stay for after school enrichment but lack transportation. This aides the District's refugee population and latch key apartment residents by providing transportation for participating after school enrichment courses. The program was further expanded in 2011 to the India House to provide transportation from Bell, Milne and Valley West Elementary. Buses from these schools take children to the India House to participate in after-school enrichment activities.



Sunday, October 16, Heisman trophy winner, former NBA player, and current head coach of the Westbury Christian School varsity football program, Charlie Ward, honored Hall of Fame Coach Bobby Bowden with the 2nd Annual Tribute to Excellence award. This year's event, attended by over 300 guests was emceed by former Houston Rockets head coach Jeff Van Gundv.

The Charlie Ward Tribute to Excellence recognizes individuals of distinction, commitment and faith. It is in conjunction with Westbury Christian School fundraising efforts to assist with the purchase of facilities, previously owned by the Westland YMCA, which administrators hope will soon house Westbury Christian School athletics. "I am very excited about the new athletic complex, and I cannot wait to utilize the space to further develop WCS athletes." said Ward.

Coach Bowden follows legendary NFL coach Tony Dungy as the 2nd recipient of this award. "Coach Bowden's willingness to help kids grow into the men that God has called them to be makes him an equally deserving candidate, and a true representative of 'excellence,'" Ward said.

Under Coach Bobby Bowden's direction and with Charlie Ward at quarterback, Florida State lost only two games, with the 1993 Seminoles winning the coveted National Championship. Both men were inducted in to the College Football Hall of Fame in 2006, and currently, Charlie leans on Bowden's lessons in leadership as he directs his athletes at WCS. 
